CELEBRATING 100 YEARS AT THE LIBRARY

HOW IT ALL BEGAN:

Corporation of the City of Nelson By-Law No. 310

Whereas at least one hundred electors have petitioned the Municipal Council of the Municipality of the Corporation of the City of Nelson, praying for the establishment of a municipal public library under the provisions of part IV of the "Public Libraries Act":

THEREFORE, the said Municipal Council enacts as follows:

1. A Municipal Public Library shall be established in this municipality pursuant to the provisions of Part IV of the "Public Libraries Act."
2. This By-law shall take effect from the date of the registration thereof.

DONE AND PASSED in Council assembled this Nineteenth Day of January, A.D. 1920.

That's how Nelson's Library officially began, but it wasn't the first iteration. Tobacconist Gilbert Stanley's 1891 reading room really started the ball rolling; by 1899, and with similar enterprises having sprung up in between, the Nelson Library Association had been formed—and the hard work to bring Nelson to the signing of that document began.

Nelson's love of books and knowledge was evident even in the earliest Days, when the Daily Miner recorded that: "Yesterday a Miner reporter had considerable difficulty in making his way through the crowd of people gathered in the reading room to the Librarian's office. The Library has become very popular and that Nelson needs such an institution has been amply demonstrated."

WHERE WE ARE NOW:

Fast forward 100 years, and the Nelson Public Library is still full of people of all ages enjoying reading, learning, and one another through a variety of programs. Although those early library enthusiasts could not have imagined how technology has enriched how we read and learn, those fundamental dreams of building a great community with opportunities for all have never changed.

- Facilitates learning, building capacity to adapt to a changing world
- Fosters creativity, an essential life skill in the new economy
- Provides public space that brings people together
- Showcases and generates enthusiasm for local culture and identity
- Contributes to our community's appeal as a vibrant place to live
- Provides what residents need to face the future with the resilience that comes from new knowledge, information, skills, and abilities.


